PRAYER

- Pray for the salvation of your unsaved loved ones.
- Ask God for the grace to endure hardship or persecution (if any). May you persevere in His hope and love until breakthrough comes.
- Believe God for the grace to keep doing the right thing, serving in love, and honoring others before self.

WHAT

This story was birthed from a very unfortunate incident—Ruth's mother-in-law Naomi lost her husband and two sons, one of them was her husband. While they were encouraged by Naomi to return to their hometowns as she returns to Judah, Ruth chose to stick it out with her and tended to her needs while she was grieving. In the end, God surprised them with a turnaround that led to the birth of the kings of Israel and ultimately the Messiah. What does this story teach us about love?

1 Love perseveres.

²And Ruth the Moabitess said to Naomi, "Let me go to the fields and pick up the leftover grain behind anyone in whose eyes I find favor." Naomi said to her, "Go ahead, my daughter." ³So she went out and began to glean in the fields behind the harvesters. As it turned out, she found herself working in a field belonging to Boaz, who was from the clan of Elimelech. RUTH 2:2,3

The need of the hour was to have food to eat and so Ruth
wasted no time and began to work. She assumed the low status
of a servant. It was a labor of love following a faith confession in
Ruth 1:16,17. God is pleased when our love is with action and trutl
(1 John 3:18; 1 Thessalonians 1:3). He responds with favor. What
can be said about Ruth's character (Ruth 2:11,12)?

2	Love is shown in obedience and honor. ⁵ "I will do whatever you say," Ruth answered. ⁶ So she went down to the threshing floor and did everything her mother-in-law told her to do. RUTH 3:5,6
	Ruth obeyed her mother-in-law's instructions. Though it was risky and perhaps fearful on her part, she honored Naomi and the practices of her people. Ultimately, Ruth's obedience and act of giving honor to Naomi showed that she trusted God (Ruth 3:11-13 What does the Bible say about honoring parents and authorities in our lives? What blessing does this bring?
3	Love endures. 13 So Boaz took Ruth and she became his wife. Then he went to her, and the LORD enabled her to conceive, and she gave birth to a son. 14 The women said to Naomi: "Praise be to the LORD, who this day has not left you without a kinsman-redeemer. May he become famous throughout Israel! 15 He will renew your life and sustain you in your old age. For your daughter-in-law, who loves you and who is better to you than seven sons, has given him birth." RUTH 4:13-15
	Ultimately, this love story was to endure for all time because it is the very story of God's love for us. Through Boaz and Ruth was to be born the Savior of the world—a very accurate picture of God coming to our rescue (Ezekiel 16:8) through Jesus, our Redeemer. Whose love endures and is sure to last forever (1 Peter 1:18,19)?
